### EMMA O'LEARY HEADS REBEKAHS

Woman for Years Active in Work of Order Chosen State President

The annual meeting of the Grand Encampment of Idaho was opened in regular form Tuesday morning with every one in good place. At the close of the opening order a committee from the Grand Encampment, Brothers O. Ross of Pocatello, Past Grand Master; W. B. Mitchell of Parma, Grand Master; N. O. Naylor of Pocatello, Past Grand Master; H. F. Peters of Idaho Falls, Past Grand Master, brought in brief greetings, were welcomed and soon retired to be succeeded by the Department Commander, Isham, and his entire staff. After a brief speech of good will, the members formed a line of honor of steel through which Past Grand Master Ross was escorted to her seat. Much of the morning was given to a discussion of the more important questions of legislation and the afternoon session was mostly given to the election of officers for the coming year. All elections were unanimous with the exception of the election of Past Grand Master. For this office five sisters were nominated: Mary Holland of Caldwell; Mae Arnold of Coeur d'Alene; Maud Miller of Sandpoint; Ed Williams of Clearwater, and Ed Hugg of Boise.

Those elected were as follows: President, Emma O'Leary; vice-president, Bertha Belmont; warden, Mae Gold; secretary, Frances Crosson; treasurer, Sarah H. Pemberton; home manager, R. Mae Martin; representative, A. R. A. Eme Watkins, P. P.; alternate, Ella M. Martin.

By unanimous motion the necessary dues money was appropriated to the Assembly Secretary Crosson to attend the secretaries' convention which meets concurrent with the meeting of Rebekah Assemblies.

Mrs. Rollin Smith and Mrs. W. C. King, both of Weiser, came in at 10 o'clock and sang two selections, "See the Pale Horse" and "Afire," accompanied by P. P. Hattabaugh. These numbers were indeed a source of pleasure to everyone present. Committees on all of the lines of the Assembly work were busy all of the afternoon upon their departments. The officers' reports to the assembly contained the following interesting facts and figures:

Vice President Emma O'Leary gives detailed report of her year's activities. This shows that she had made sixteen special lodge visitations, two to the Home, attended three district meetings, one lodge meeting in Oregon, one anniversary meeting at O. O. F. picnic and attended the whole of the sessions of the Utah State Assembly.

The P. N. G.'s club of Weiser entertained President Watkins and Vice President O'Leary at a reception at the home of Sister Curtis.

Assembly Warden Bertha Belmont was scarcely less busy than the vice president, making eleven lodge visitations, two anniversary and one district meetings, and the full sessions of the Utah State Assembly.

### GRAND-ENCAMPMENT IN CLOSING SESSION

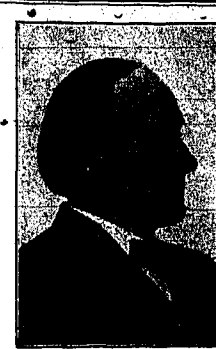
Address by Grand Patriarch Elect and Routine Work

Session Are Attended By Very Full Representation From Lodges of State.

The Grand Lodge of Idaho I. O. O. F., opened its annual meeting Tuesday at 1:30 o'clock with every one present, and also the full roster of home trustees and permanent finance committee members. Grand Master Carl O. Johnson presided.

Chairman Fred Moore from the committee on credentials, and Chairman T. B. Jackson from the committee on distribution of moneys for consideration by different committees, made the first reports, which were disposed of and the officers' reports were given the proper reference.

The Grand Encampment degree was conferred upon 99 new members. The names of those receiving the degree and their lodges will be found elsewhere in this issue.

The keynote resolution was introduced by Past Grand Master A. E. Gibson in which the election of Grand Representative Frank Martin as Deputy Grand Patriarch was featured and the Grand Lodge, by a rising vote and with great enthusiasm, pledged the membership to a campaign of strong activity for the advancement of Odd Fellowship along all lines in Idaho.

Following this action Deputy Grand Patriarch Martin was introduced under escort of Department Commander Isham and staff.

This was also in the nature of an official visit by the Department Council and the Department Commander made a spirited address commending the military branch and the work it was doing, also complimenting the administration of Grand Master Johnson and the great service that official had rendered the department, and the Cantons composing it.

The Department Commander and staff were in full dress uniform and wore under the command of Col. Alton Berg.

Deputy Grand Patriarch Martin was then welcomed by Grand Master Johnson and introduced. He received a great ovation as he rose to address the Grand Lodge. Announced by the slogan in the application of the tenets of the order, the coming year would be made the greatest one in its history.

The Grand Lodge was honored by a visit from Grand Master L. D. Porter and Past Grand Master S. A. Bowman of Oregon. They were most cordially received and made happy addresses. Past Grand Master Taylor of Oregon was also a most welcome visitor.

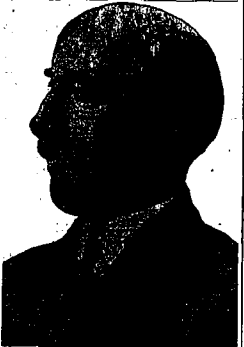

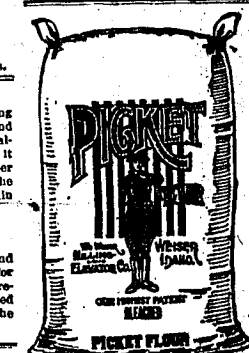
