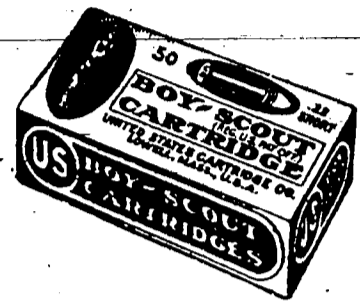

CAPTURE SEED PRIZES

Idaho Growers Make Good Winning at Chicago Seed Show

First prizes taken by Idaho seeds in competition with all North America at the international grain and hay show in Chicago demonstrate again that the state of Idaho is a leader in its possibilities for the small seed industry.

Some of Idaho's awards were won in classes in which there were 4,000 entries.

Thirty-one awards, four of which were firsts, four seconds and four thirds, were taken by seed exhibitors from Idaho in this show, held

in connection with the international Livestock show, says the telegram to Dean E. J. Idings, of the college of agriculture from C. B. Ahlson, field agronomist with the University of Idaho extension division, who accompanied the Gem State exhibits to Chicago. The Idaho exhibits were prepared by the Idaho Seedgrowers' association in co-operation with the college of agriculture through the extension service agronomists and selected by Mr. Ahlson, state seed growers and experts from the college of agriculture.

In red clover, Idaho entries took eight out of 15 possible awards. The winners were as follows: T. H. Reinke, Buhl, first; William Benning,

Jerome, third; Howard Darrow, Twin Falls, fourth; R. W. Bessicker, Boise, fifth; Van Matro and Peckham, Wilder, seventh; T. J. Matthews, Boise, eleventh; C. R. Peckham, Wilder, thirteenth; Oheim and Dobberschutz, Buhl, fourteenth.

In alisk clover, entries from Idaho took first, second, third, fourth, fifth and eighth. The results were: Ben Johnson, Buhl, first; Ira J. Wenger, Aberdeen, second; E. W. Denny, Buhl, third; J. W. Hardin, Kimberly, fourth; H. C. Berryman, Burley, fifth; Bert Wolf, Burley, eighth.

The first four places in timothy were also taken by Gem State seed. W. H. Matoney, Donnelly, was awarded first; Henry Moore, Donnelly, second; Glenn Straw, Alpha, third; P. Mickelson, Donnelly, fourth.

In alfalfa the following Idaho entries were awarded places: A. Milton, Burley, first; H. E. Goodfellow, Brad, Wendell, eighth; R. J. Day, Twin Falls, fourteenth.

Winning in other departments were: Hayley—Ed Moser, Aberdeen, a former student of the college of agriculture, first; S. R. Goodfellow, Burley, second; Randolph Mosier, Aberdeen, fourth; Fred Bienz, Buhl, twentieth.

White spring wheat—F. M. Tucker, Fairfield, third; A. E. Friedland, Fairfield, fourth; Earnest Bowling, Fairfield, fifth; W. R. Gierisch, Burley, sixth; Mr. Noble, Burley, twelfth.

Sweet clover: Herman Brand, Wendell, second.

"For many years the statement has been made that Idaho seed excelled in quality," said Dean Idings, commenting upon the results. "It is many doubted it. But this showing has sufficiently proven their superiority. The winnings entitle the Idaho growers to cash prizes totaling \$425."

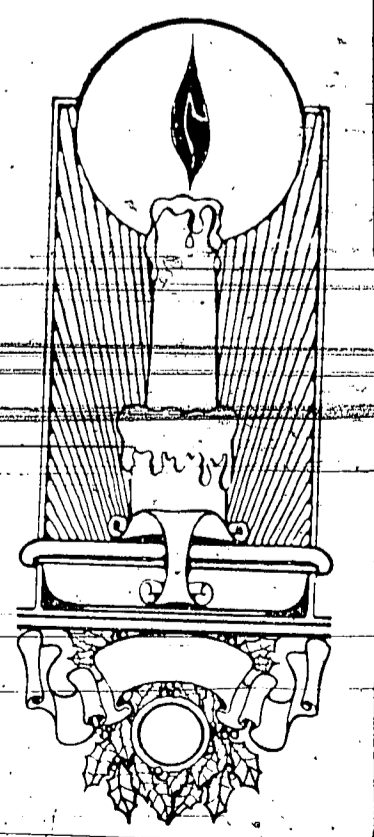


Fortieth Anniversary Issue
