## Farmers can reduce taxes by shifting income to '81

MOSCOW, Idaho — A University of Idaho economist believes farmers can reduce their income taxes by carefully controlling their marketing programs for the rest of the year so that a sizeable portion of their 1980 earnings will be shifted forward to 1981.

Dr. Neil Meyer, economist for the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service, said income reported next year should be taxed at a lower rate than income on the 1980 tax return. "A cut in federal income taxes is virtually certain to be approved by Congress in the next few months," he explained.

While discussing end-of-the-year tax management, Meyer said tax-deductible expenses and contributions which are paid this year will reduce the taxpayer's 1980 taxable income. He said substantial tax savings are in prospect for farmers who claim maximum deductions in 1980 while shifting portions of taxable income into 1981.

"If your 1980 income is higher than it has been in recent years, this may be the year you will want to use income-averaging, investment credit and fast depreciation," he added.

The University of Idaho economist said people who are reporting low incomes should try to avoid losing tax savings that are built-in features of the Internal Revenue system.

"The personal deductions and zero bracket will be lost if they are not used in the year they are available. The zero bracket for a married couple is \$3,400 taxable income. They have an additional \$1,000 for each dependent. A man and wife with two children are eligible for \$5,400 tax-free income," Meyer pointed out.

In a high-income year, income-averaging may reduce taxes, Meyer said. To use this special method of computing taxes, the taxpayer's taxable income for 1980 must exceed his average income for the four preceding years by at least \$3,000.

Meyer said tax-deductible expenses and contributions which are paid this year will reduce the taxpayer's 1980 taxable income. He said substantial tax savings are in prospect for farmers who claim maximum deductions in 1980 while shifting portions of taxable income into 1981.

Other tax savings are possible if depreciation of machinery, buildings and other assets is computed by using the "declining balance" or "sum of years digits" depreciation schedules.

"If you select an accelerated depreciation schedule, you will obtain more depreciation in the early years of an asset's economic life," Meyer explained.

Farmers may want to be in a high bracket for social security income, Meyer said. For 1980, the payment of self-employment tax on \$25,900 income would place the farmer-taxpayer in the top social security bracket.

A 10 percent business energy credit is available for certain types of alternative energy devices. Alternative primary fuel is any substance other than oil and natural gas or their products. Wind and solar energy devices also are eligible for the energy credit.

Meyer offered these tax tips for farm families:

- Loans, gifts and savings bonds redeemed are not taxable income.
- For autos or trucks used in the farm business, claim as a business deduction the farm share of operating expenses. Licenses, insurance and depreciation. The farm share is often more than 50 percent of the total.
- Losses should be claimed. For example, deduct the value of livestock that died, strayed away or were stolen.
- Farm business expenses include subscriptions to farm magazines and newspapers, farm organization membership dues, long distance calls and part of the regular phone service. Bank service charges, business trips and supplies used for hired workers.
- Deductible health expenses include not only dental and hospital bills but also accident and health insurance plus the medical coverage of the auto insurance policy.
- Paying all bills by check will simplify record-keeping and the calculating of taxes, Meyer said.
- Keep all paid receipts for five years. On items for which investment credit is claimed, receipts must be saved for seven years.

## When you apply for Social Security . . . be prepared

Do you plan to apply soon for social security benefits? If so, here's a tip: Be prepared with as much needed information as possible. This should help you get that first check faster.

Both you and any eligible dependents will need your social security cards. You'll also need your birth certificates or other suitable proof of age. As a wage earner or self-employed person, you will need your latest W-2 for (Wage and Tax Statement) or self-employment tax return because earnings for the previous year will not yet appear on your social security earnings record.

Additional information may be needed in your individual case. For example, if you are filing for monthly disability benefits, you should have a list of doctors, hospitals, or other facilities where you have been examined or treated. If you apply for survivors payments, proof of death and marriage are needed.

"Inquire before you retire" is particularly good advice if your retirement plans are uncertain. For example, you may be undecided on whether to start drawing reduced benefits before 65 or wait and get your full amount at 65. You may want to know more about how your benefit can be increased by delaying your retirement until after 65. And, you can continue working and still draw some benefits.

All these and other questions can be answered by the people in any social security office. It's a good idea to contact them at least two or three months before you think you may retire. In that way your checks can start on time if you actually do decide to apply.

If you are nearing 65, you should know that you do not have to retire to get Medicare protection. But, you must apply for it. This should be done a few months before you are 65 so you receive full coverage at the earliest possible time.

If you are severely disabled before 65, contact the Social Security Office whenever it answers your inquiry will keep you from doing painful work at least a year. Payments to you and your dependents can start with the sixth full month of disability. In addition to providing details of medical treatment, it will help if you also have a summary of where and when you have worked in recent years.

While it is an advantage to have as much information as possible when you file a claim, don't delay your application just because you don't have everything yet. This might cause you to lose some checks.

Keep in mind that most Social Security business can be handled by phone. This means that some or all of your claim may be handled without you having to visit the Social Security Office. Look under "Social Security Administration" in your phone book for the number. The best business time to call is in the afternoon or during the last half of the month.

## Stallion service auction to aid Gold Rush ride

The Fourth Annual All Breed Stallion Service Auction will be held Feb. 7, 1981, at Winchester's "Happy Heart Arena," Kuna Hwy, Kuna, Idaho.

Basically, this is how the auction is handled. Stallion owners donate one breeding mare to the auction. If the mare is sold, the stallion is seen by 400-500 people who come to the auction to look, bid, or plan for future foals.

The Auction is a fair auction, with bids starting at \$50 and going up. Many shires attend, to compare breeds, and to purchase a service for a grade or particular mare. For this reason, the services usually sell for less than the standing fee.

The service is all the stallion owners donate. Care of the mare, etc., is up to the stallion and mare owners to arrange. Stallion owners have been known to book more services at their regular "standing fee" at the auction.

Because of the size of the arena, the stallions can be shown "in hand or under saddle." The stallions must be presented at the auction. Stallions not present may not sell.

If you are planning on breeding a mare or two this year, come to the auction. Many fine stallions will be available for inspection. 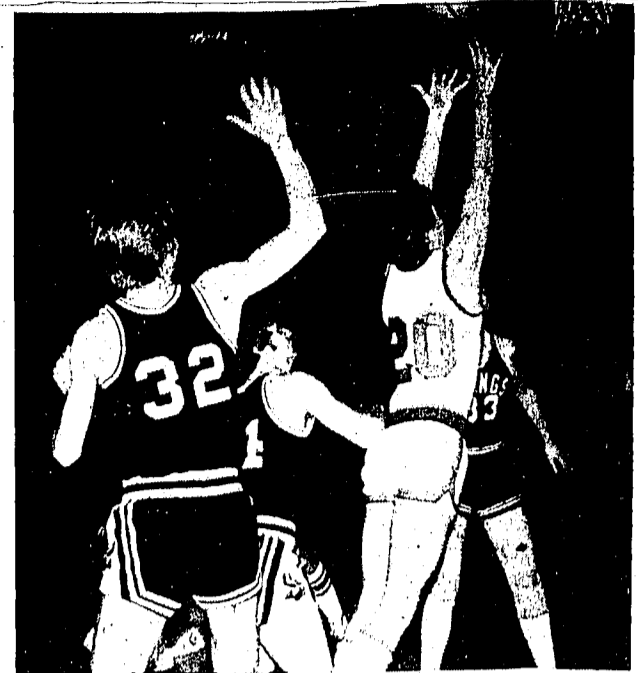

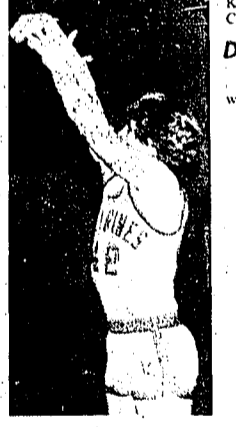

After two great starts against non-conference competition, we now begin play in the Snake River Valley Conference with games against Vallivuo on Friday and Emmett on Saturday.

Both are impressive in size and they are both great rebounding teams. We feel we'll be able to neutralize this advantage with our speed and quickness, and with our fast-break style of play. Both teams employ a zone defense and fast-break type of offense.  
It's unfortunate that this year's scheduling has put us into two crucial games in two days this early in the season but that's the way it's worked out.
