

Tomorrow Ends Filings for Wool Support Payment

January 31 is the last day for filing applications for 1963 marketing year payments under the National Wool Act. Growers were reminded today. The applications cover wool and lamb marketings during the nine-month period from April 1 through Dec. 31, 1963.

Later marketings will be eligible for program payments for the 1964 marketing year, which begins the first of the year. Beginning this year, the wool marketing year will be for 12 months coinciding with the calendar year.

Chairman Clarence Blumner pointed out that since the 1963 program was extended these months earlier than in previous years the 1964 payments will likely begin in April instead of late summer.

Chairman Blumner reminded growers that the purpose of the National Wool Act — enacted in 1934 — was to encourage the domestic production of wool. The authorized program provides for payments on shorn wool and unshorn lambs based on mohair, if needed, based on a percentage of each producer's cash returns from sales. The percentage that is required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool to the announced incentive price.

The incentive price for lack of wool, announced at 72 cents a pound — continuing the level in effect since the beginning of the program in 1955.

\$243,906 Earmarked For Mental Health

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, reported that \$243,906 has been earmarked for Idaho as federal matching funds for comprehensive community mental health centers and state retardation centers in the 1965 fiscal budget. The funds would be available after July 1 if Congress approves the Health, Education and Welfare appropriations by that date, Church said.

Of the total for Idaho, \$143,906 could be available as matching funds for comprehensive community mental health centers, and the remaining \$100,000 as matching funds for the state retardation centers. Comprehensive community mental health centers offer 24-hour multiple treatment facilities and provide both in-patient and out-patient care at the community level.
