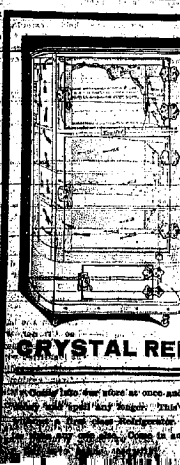

AN ARMY OF PECCARIES.

Pigs Fight as Three Tons and Wild Pigs of South America.

The spectacle of South American wild pigs fighting because they attacked their equals in large bodies and with great vigor and bravery. The method and skill of their warfare suggests that they are led by either skillful enough to predatory warfare to direct the surrounding and destruction of a powerful jaguar.

The object to be started is surrounded in a alliance by a circle of hundreds of peccaries. At a given signal a simultaneous stamping of teeth against the ground followed by a converging rush toward the center. The largest and strongest reach the center and the smaller pig, rearing up in the air, is the one in the rear, but the center is constantly confronted by a mass of pigs, no matter how many he may have slain.

An American engineer while surveying a Brazilian forest for a railway line was surprised to find a herd of peccaries one night and with difficulty escaped them. The experience affords an illustration of the bravery of these wild pigs.

One day he and his party came upon a swamp, the swampy ground, the odor of which indicated that it was the headquarters of all the peccaries in the vicinity. But not a pig was to be seen. The camp was fortified and the night there came an alarm. Suddenly from all around rose the sound of simultaneous stamping of teeth and then came the charge of hundreds of black animals rushing toward the fort.

Stamps were discharged, and the occupants fled toward the swampy ground. Their knives at the swarming pigs below. Numbers of these were cut down by the men in the fort, but others, impelled by those in the rear, threw themselves forward, jumping and slashing with their sharp tusks.

Suddenly the attack ceased. The animals and silently withdrew. Then without a moment's warning saw the front of teeth cutting another wild animal and the fight was renewed. Again the pigs drew off, and again they renewed the battle. Seven times they charged during the night and not until daybreak was the last grunt heard.

Spend Millions for Good Roads.

From every section of the country a persistent demand for good roads, Colorado, Kansas, Wyoming, Utah and Idaho will spend millions of dollars for improved road systems and intercontinental highways during the next few years. Intercontinental highways will bring hundreds of thousands of people across the country to the International Exposition in San Diego and San Francisco in 1915. They will travel in autos, take their time, and spend plenty of money by the way. The United States highway commission is negotiating with the Utah highway commission and will assist in the improving of the road between Grand Junction and Price, Utah. Jan. 22, 1914 a big road building convention will be held at Salt Lake. Governors and other officials of western states have been invited to send delegates. The strengthening of Colorado declared the bill providing for the use of the Internal Improvement funds for road roads unconstitutional on a technicality. A new bill will be introduced.
