AMERICAN FACTORY OUTPUT

Value in \$100,000,000 According to Government Report.

Twenty million dollars is the value of the present annual output of American factories, the total having just exceeded the last ten years, according to a summary of factory output in the United States in 1911 amounting to over \$2,015,000,000 of which \$100,000,000 is in manufactures. This, the government points out, shows that the bulk of the export trade is acquired through the selling of goods, but it also shows that the bulk of the goods are sold here.

Germany is credited with being the greatest user of the United States' manufactures.
