

### CITY DADS HOLD REGULAR SESSION

City Dads' Meeting, Tuesday, July 1, at 8:00 p. m. at the Fire House, 21st and Park.

When Mayor Ayres called the honorable council to order for the night this evening, the following members were present: Councilmen Smith, Klob, Hans, Erickson, Lloyd and Clark. Absent: Councilman Wideman.

Minutes of previous meetings read and approved. Manager Brisco of the Studebaker people appeared before the council to fix up some matters regarding the car available recently ordered. Things were fixed and Brisco went on his way rejoicing.

Mr. M. G. Calver, member of the Fourth ward committee, appeared at this time on behalf of the committee to ask for certain concessions or privileges for the celebration. Among the privileges asked for was to place seats along State street for people who cannot find seats in the stands. In the evening, the committee will arrange for drinking fountains. Requests were granted.

In regard to drinking fountains, Superintendent Priest stated he had ordered four fountains which he expected would arrive in time to be put in use on the Fourth. At any rate proper arrangements will be made for the comfort of visitors.

Dr. J. P. Kimball and Dr. J. C. Smith, for vaccination of children, were in Lincoln street tract referred to street and children to investigate. Mr. Kimball was present in behalf of the petitioners.

The council at this time proceeded to canvass the returns of the special bond election with results as already given in the Signal.

Chief Travis was instructed to advise for bids for the sale of 112,666 of the bonds just voted. Bids will be opened July 12.

Who will the contractor in a long business? Dr. J. P. Kimball who conducts a peanut and popcorn stand, asked for exclusive right to operate the business on the streets of the city. The council at once started kicking the application around and it was finally tabled indefinitely.

Application from Frank Harris asking for certain improvements on East Coast street was referred to the city attorney.

The next grave matter to come up for the very serious consideration of the august body was to procure a site and erect a post house. It will be remembered that a tent house was erected on East Commercial street last fall and a small post office placed there. The residents of that section protested so strong that the tent house, pillars and all were moved to the west side of town on the bank of the Snake, immediately after the battle was discharged and before the tent could be fumigated or burned, some light fingered individual picked it up bodily and disappeared with it.

Thus the city was cruelly deprived of a proper place for carrying for veterinary diseases, hence the action Friday night. After considerable discussion it was decided that a committee should be appointed with power to act in securing a site and

build the house. Major Ayres so graciously realized that a site could be secured by placing two real estate men on the committee, which he did. Said post house committee consists of Klob, Lloyd and Smith.

The city clerk was authorized to pay the interest due July 1 on bonds already in force. Usual batch of bills O. K.'d by the finance committee was allowed and ordered paid.

Council adjourned "DITL" Tuesday evening, June 18, at 8 o'clock.

### Crude Thoughts From the Editorial Pen

You look at the housewife who has a place for her things, and those things in their places, and you find a woman who is systematic in her work; and when she picks anything she can put her hands on it in a moment. She plans and calculates whenever there is to be extra work. Soaking, extra washing, etc., she knows before hand just what there is to do, and what she wants to do it with. And this same woman, in exact in her doing, gets more time rest and peace, and that rest and children in the path of right and the social duties they owe to all. Ladies, we hope you of your class, receiving the blessing of your husband, and the praise of all who know you.

As we stand in front of the post office yesterday we were forced to be silent as a conversation between two young ladies. They were talking about a third-party and christened her an "old maid." We came as near being told we were "old" over done.

Buttermilk is a rich in Protein, the Most Easily of Food ingredients. An ordinary glass of buttermilk contains about four times as much protein as a half pint of milk, says a bulletin of the United States department of agriculture. It is most nutritious because it contains the same food constituents as skim milk, but has an added typical value because the result is much more quickly digested than the protein in skim milk and therefore is often prescribed by physicians for children and invalids, especially those suffering from intestinal trouble.

Protein, the most costly of food ingredients, is the one most likely to be lacking in nutritive value, and this is the nutrient which both skim milk and buttermilk supply in a cheap and easily digested and nutritious form. Bread, oil and sugar, which are very nutritious addition to the diet, two and one-half quarts of skim milk, two and one-half quarts of cream, and one quart of buttermilk contain a greater nutritive value than one quart of cream. The nutrient in the form of cream would cost 30 to 50 cents, while the equivalent of buttermilk would have a value on the farm of from 2 to 5 cents.

**The Old Charcoal Burner.**  
The charcoal burner may still be found within thirty miles of London. This writer knows a charcoal burner who has carried on his ancient trade for forty years in Surrey and Sussex. You come suddenly upon the pile of wood and near it is his workshop constructed but of wicker, fern and leather, with its rough corner pieces and beams and rafters. During the whole period of the charcoal business, keeping a sharp lookout to see if any suspicious persons do not pass, an incubator sits upon the mountain which might result in a sudden burst of flame and the rate of that particular job. The man is his own master. He knows his market and makes a decent living—a curious, satisfactory life, but he knows all about the thing—London Chronicle.

### A FREAK OF THE SEA.

Fury of the Mighty Powers That Sometimes Attack a Coast.  
Among the daily dangers which "freaks" have to do with the sea in "wild" have to encounter most frequent one that strange phenomenon known as "the rollers" a succession of immense waves which in certain localities set in upon a coast without the least previous indication, rendering the use of boats impossible or at the best a very precarious proceeding. The waves of the rollers occur in the Pacific and Atlantic and south Pacific, being marked by fell or exposed islands such as Ascension and St. Helena in the former ocean and in the latter at the Chiriquian Islands and other islands off the coast of Peru.

The sea may be of perfect calmness, the breeze for days previously having been a soft, pleasant breeze at first apparently quite leisurely, with it reaches any solid mass of reef, rock or shore. As it is caused to anger by the obstruction, the rollers are up and dash upon the shore with tremendous fury. This wave is quickly followed by others, meeting in violence, until all that remains of a vessel is to be excavated in the wild-storm. A visit of the rollers may come from five or six hours or more, or it may last but a few minutes, but it is that they come from seaward, and in whatever direction from the usual wind of the locality—World Wide Magazine.

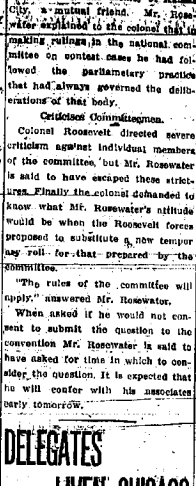

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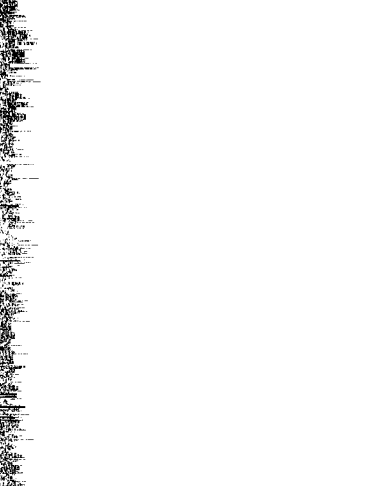

**SPOILED A SPANISH PLOT.**

Edward of Luton says for saving Amsterdam's Stock Exchange.

Of the many quiet and curious customs, traditions and prejudices prevailing in Holland none is quite as extraordinary as a certain privilege that has been enjoyed by the boys of Amsterdam for nearly 300 years.

At a fixed time each summer these boys gather by the hundreds in the great square and the Dutch situated in the center of the city. Each boy has a drum along over his shoulder.

Facing the square is the Stock Exchange and on this square is situated a building, just as soon as the day's business is over, as many of the boys can crowd into the building. They proceed to the floor of the exchange, where, pursuant to this old custom, they are permitted to amuse about, singing and beating their drums.

The origin of this custom—it is said—is as follows:

One afternoon in the year 1622 a crowd of boys playing in the town hall built in the count that in their days skirted up side of the square. One of the boys while climbing among the pipes on which the building stood, found instead of his ball a hot iron rod in a dark corner and loaded with boxes of gunpowder. This showed clearly enough what was afterward ascertained with certainty, the intention of the Spanish conspirators to blow up the Stock Exchange while it was crowded as it was every day, with the leading citizens of the city.

The boy then stumbled upon the gun powder at once hurried to the town authorities with his news. The boatload of explosives was quietly sunk in the canal and the Spanish plot thus frustrated.

When the burgesses asked the boy who had done the deed he replied that so long as there was a stock exchange in Amsterdam the boys of the town would be permitted to make the floor of the exchange their playground during a certain part of the day.

The request was granted, and so the custom survives.—New York Times.
