WASHINGTON, May 26.—One

that thousands of protests would be

filed against its passage. Yet some

of the protests are seemingly well

taken. For instance, Rev. James

Mullen, of Waverly, Iowa, submitted

to Senator A. B. Cummins of that

State a memorial against the bill and

in the course of his statement de-

clared that "while the people could

be persuaded that the provisions

of the bill for the common good,

there was no general protest, but as

they have grown to suspect that

the interest of a predatory or

quandary was the chief end being

served, there has come an earnest

and widespread opposition to the

bill, and this is met with the present

effort to buttress themselves behind

the power and influence of the fed-

eral government." He says that un-

der the bill "assumption of power

through the formulation of rules

could be carried to almost any ex-

treme."

by so many people might very well

be held over for a year or two in

order that it might be given more

complete investigation.

Conservation of Human Life

Science has made strides in the

to consider what sites their states  
should be given for buildings. The

the exposition, but the whole country  
is being studied for the best sites for  
exhibits.
