I'm going to start off with one of the best deer hunting stories I've ever heard and I just hope I can do it justice.

They were hunting an area off Cove Road, driving along an old track through the sage brush when Doug spotted deer off to the side. They all baited out (Doug's son-in-law, Rob, and his daughter were along), and all of them headed down toward the deer. They saw that the two deer were both does but, just then, two bucks jumped up.

At the shot, one of them dropped but jumped right back up. Luke fired again and it went down again. When they reached the animal, they saw that the first shot had broken a shoulder and the second had hit in the back and exited through the chest. After five minutes or so of back slapping and such, Doug pulled the deer's head downhill and cut its throat. Rob headed back up to the pickup to drive it down to the kill.

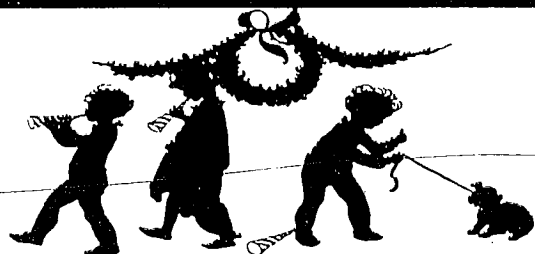

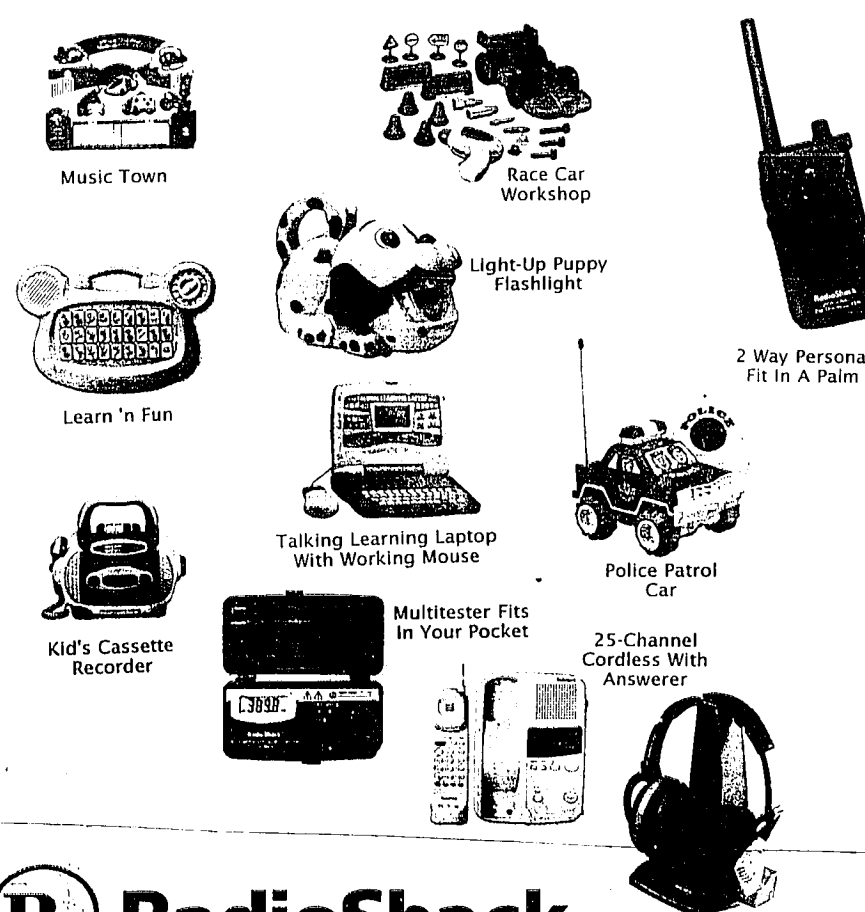
