 Docket No. 92-0414-9501, Dairy Waste. Rules designed to improve Idaho water quality by initiating a dairy waste inspection program on Idaho dairy farms. Comment By: December 27, 1995.
 - Docket No. 02-0613-9501, Rapeseed Production.** Amendment will allow farmers in Rapeseed Production District III (all land south of the Clearwater River and north of the Salmon River) to plant the winter edible type of rapeseed. Comment By: December 27, 1995.
 - Docket No. 02-0684-9501, Virus-Free Certification of Nursery Stock.** Voluntary program that provides for certifying nursery stock to be "virus free" for export to other countries, especially Canada, by establishing isolation distances for nursery stock from other plants, procedures for the inspection, sampling, testing and maintaining the identity of nursery stock, and a schedule of fees. Dear Santa Letter Tips



Every holiday season the Postal Service receives thousands of letters to Santa Claus.

Although Santa is so well known that any letter will reach him, it's a good idea to put his complete address on your letter. Send Santa letters to: Santa Claus, 325 S. Santa Claus Lane, North Pole, AK 99705-9998.

Youngsters may write directly to Santa at this address. Those letters that arrive at North Pole by Dec. 1 will receive a handwritten response. For a form letter return, the deadline is Dec. 5. After that date, the letter may not be responded to until after Christmas.

Parents who would like to have a response from Santa sent to their children with a North Pole postmark can write the letter from Santa (or have a friend do it if the parent's handwriting would be recognized) and follow these guidelines:

• Completely address and apply postage stamps to the

envelope or envelopes you wish to have postmarked.

• Insert the items into a

larger envelope or container • Include a note requesting the North Pole post-

mark. Send to: North Pole Cancellations, U.S. Postal Service, 5400 Mail Trail, Fairbanks, AK 99709-9996.

Those wishing to have holiday cards they are sending to friends receive the North Pole postmark should send the cards already addressed and stamped to the Fairbanks address above. To receive this cancellation and have the letter delivered by Christmas, the cards should arrive in Fairbanks by Dec. 10. Express Mail is recommended for those sent after Dec. 1. Customers who want confirmation that their cards

were received in Fairbanks should use Certified Priority Mail with Return Receipt, or for Express Mail call 1-800-222-1811 for confirmation through the Postal Service's tracking service. The cards will be postmarked North Pole and enter the mail stream at Fairbanks. Customers cannot have their postmarked cards returned to them for mailing from their own town.

Incidentally, the Postal Service knows where Santa lives, so letters addressed just "Santa" or "Santa Claus" will be delivered.

Dave and Wendy Allen, and their children Aaron and Alaina, travel to Weiser to be with their family each Thanksgiving, then the following day, (usually white Wendy and her mom, Dolores, go shopping). Dave decorates the front yard tree. The decorating of the tree started in 1982 when this well-shaped pine tree stood a bit smaller. The first year, Dave, who stands at 6 feet, 7 inches, could decorate standing on the ground. The next year they had to stand on the back of a pickup truck. Now the 35-foot tree takes a little more ingenuity on Dave's part. He now has the help of their son who has grown along with the pine tree over the years. Aaron, a senior in high school, also stands at 6-foot, 7-inches and like the pine tree, is still growing. The process starts by taking 30 strings of lights, linking them into 50-foot strands, and laying them on the front lawn for a bulb check. With 750 bulbs, this takes a bit of time and

PUMPKIN BAR

4 eggs
1 cup oil
2 cups flour
2 tsp. cinnamon
1 16-oz. can (2 cups) pumpkin
1 tsp. baking soda
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
Beat eggs, oil, sugar and pumpkin until light. Mix

dry ingredients and add to pumpkin mixture. Spread in cookie pan (ungreased). Bake 20-30 minutes at 350 degrees. Don't overbake.
Icing
1/2 cup soft butter
2 cups powder sugar
1 3-oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 tsp. vanilla
Beat ingredients together and spread on cooled bars. Serves 24 people.

CANDIED FRUIT SLICES

1 cup powdered sugar
1 cup margarine or butter, softened
1 egg
2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/4 tsp. cream of tartar
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup cut-up mixed candied fruit
1 cup whole candied cherries

Mix powdered sugar, margarine and egg. Mix in remaining ingredients. Divide into halves. Shape each half into roll, about 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Wrap and refrigerate at least 4 hours. Heat oven to 375 de-

grees. Cut rolls into 1/8-inch slides. Place about 1 inch apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake until set, about 8 minutes. Immediately remove from cookie sheet. Makes about 6 dozen.

1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
Heat oven to 375 degrees. Mix sugar, margarine, shortening, eggs and vanilla. Stir in remaining ingredients. Shape dough into 1-inch balls. Place about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Flatten with greased bottom of glass dipped in sugar. Bake until light brown, 8 to 9 minutes. Makes about 3 1/2 dozen.
*If using self-rising flour, omit salt.
