



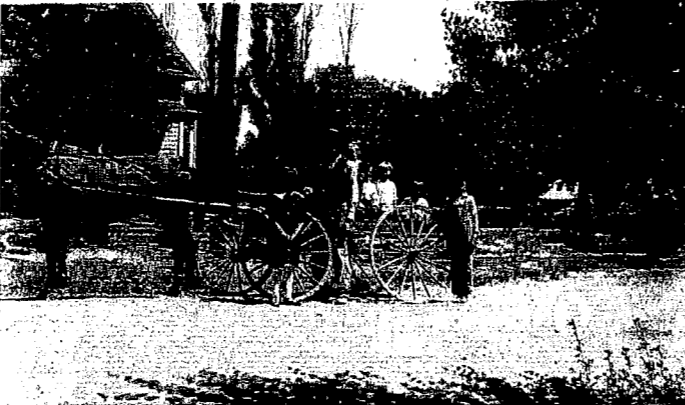
### IN DAYS OF OLD Items Cleared From Files of The Signal

**75 Years Ago**  
MAY 22, 1930  
Drillers at the Crystal well near here believe they are nearing the main body of gas. They struck a small flow yesterday which caused considerable excitement around town when news spread. Several carloads of people went out to the well immediately and L. W. Kijne, superintendent showed everybody how it burned. The long hauler would be sent down to the bottom of the well and then hoisted up again. After several feet of the water at the top of the biter was poured out, a match placed to the top would ignite a gas flame which would burn for several minutes. The experts on the job feel that they have struck a fissure of gas and that the main body should be encountered within the next several hundred feet.

She said she had no previous knowledge of this photo, but she confirmed that her family had resided on West Seventh when she was a young girl. She also recalled that a man with a horse-drawn wagon used to pass through the neighborhood, and kids enjoyed hopping aboard the wagon whenever they were offered the opportunity. We assume the man pictured here is the owner of the horse and wagon. Further, since Lela's parents, Del and Alice Hetrick, had only three kids in all, at least half of the kids in this shot figure not to be Hetricks. Lela guessed the photo would date from the early 1920s, which is the period she associates with the wagon man's trips through the West Seventh neighborhood. The Hetricks' home (not necessarily the structure partially visible here) was located where the Wildwood apartment complex now stands.

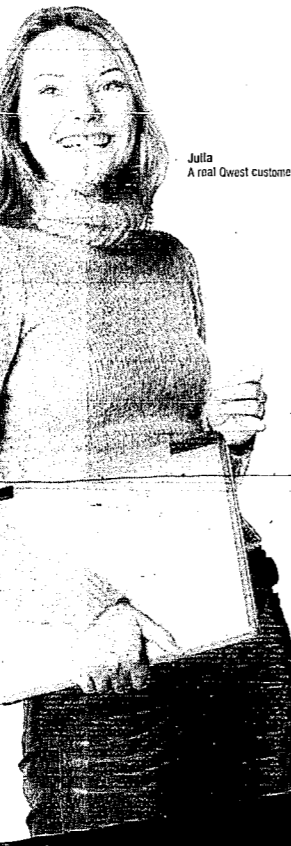

### Weiser U-14 boys win two lose one in President's Cup

Weiser's under-14 boys' soccer team finished in a three-way tie for the championship round of the President's Cup tournament in Boise last weekend.

The Weiser boys defeated High Desert from Boise 3-1 and Sawtooth United 3-2, but lost 4-1 to Twin Falls in the final game of the qualifying round of the tournament. Ismael Jaramila later found the back of the net off his left foot putting Weiser up 2-0. The third and final goal was scored by Omar Almanza — a high outside shot over the keeper's head.
