Weiser FHA delegates successful at Nat'l. meet

Weiser High School Future Homemakers of America delegates were very successful at their National Meeting in Orlando, Fla., recently. Molly Craig, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kent Craig and DeAnn Woodruff, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Woodruff, attended as the State President and S.T.A.R. Compellor, respectively. Molly served as Idaho's voting delegate and leader. DeAnn received a three star gold medal for her presentation on grocery shopping. The judges gave her a score of 97.6 out of 100.

The youth-developed meeting theme, "Spotlight on You," emphasized the organization's belief in the importance of each member and volunteer adviser. The meeting stressed the philosophy of Future Homemakers of America that youth can make a difference in society... that individual efforts cooperatively combined result in group projects that work. At the same time, the theme congratulated the adult advisers who guide the chapters and who offer their support, expertise and personal time to members.

The four-day meeting featured an adult track with sessions and activities tailored to the needs and interest of advisers. Those sessions were attended by Jane Betts. The focus was on the new Power-of-One projects which emphasize student's personal growth and development. Also, Walt Disney World provided an afternoon seminar, "Marketing the Good News about Future Homemakers of America." In addition, advisers attended workshops and focus sessions dealing with current social issues that affect the family and community such as fitness and nutrition, teen suicide, child abuse, family relations, community service, future careers, and teenage pregnancy.

DeAnn and Molly attended similar workshops designed to help the members become more active in their local chapters and also to give them more information for their own personal growth and development. They joined 40 other delegates from Idaho and 2,700 other student members and advisors at the brand new Marriott World Center. Delegates from Idaho received eight gold, three silver, and one bronze medal in competitive events, a \$1,000 March of Dimes scholarship award, placed a member on the *Teen Times* Youth Editorial Board, presented workshop sessions, and were recognized for being one of five states which increased membership by more than 10 percent. The Idaho increase was 27 percent or a 356 member increase.

Future Homemakers of America is a national vocational student organization of 325,000 home economics students through grade 12. The emphasis of programs is preparing youth to assume their adult roles in society. It is unique among youth organizations because programs are planned and run by its student members. This prime focus of Future Homemakers of America, youth-centered leadership, helps members develop those "skills for life" planning, goal setting, problem solving, decision making and interpersonal communication - necessary in the workplace and in the home.

Future Homemakers of America is the only in-school organization with the family as its central focus. Many community people helped the Weiser chapter in their fund raising efforts, so that these students could have such an outstanding educational opportunity.
