FORFEITED HIS BOND

Sheriff Landon Captures Ira Baird in Canada.

STAND TRIAL TODAY

Charges of Grand Larceny—As Conducting Hotel When Arrested.

Early morning Sheriff Landon was out from Staley, Province of Ontario, to bring back to Idaho, a resident of this county, who was arrested on a charge of grand larceny of \$1,000 worth of clothing and other goods.

Landon was arrested with the papers, but did not see a trial until yesterday morning. He was held in the jail here until this morning.

The trial was held in the forenoon of the 17th inst. and was presided over by Judge J. H. Phillips.

The case was a felony in the spring of 1904, when Landon was charged with grand larceny of \$1,000 worth of clothing and other goods belonging to parties in the northern part of the State.

The goods were stolen from the store of J. H. Phillips, at Anderson, Idaho, and were valued at two hundred and fifty dollars.

3000 Tons to be Delivered at Council.

FOR SUMPTER, SMELTER

Oregon Refining and Smelting Company Contract With Kramer & Barbour to Handle the Ore.

Wednesday afternoon a contract was entered into between Fred O. Patton, general manager of the Oregon Smelting & Refining Company at Sumpter, and Peter Kramer and Robert Barbour of Council Bluffs, Iowa.

The contract calls for the delivery of 3,000 tons of ore or more, from the L. H. Stevens, Duvall, to Council Bluffs, from which point it will be shipped by rail to the smelter at Sumpter.

The contract was made for a period of one year, and the price of the ore is to be determined by the market at the time of delivery.
